MASK MAKING WORKSHOP...

Beginning with a base of a styrofoam manikin head, participants will build a free form mask using medical plaster infused bandages as the main material. **Day 1** will be building the mask form including details by layering strips onto this form and personalizing the shape of the mask. Once dry, **Day 2** will be spent exploring ways to embellish the mask (paint, tissue, beads, etc.)

DATE: Saturday, April 18 and Saturday, April 25

TIME: 1:00 - 4:00 LOCATION: TBA

SUPPLIES provided by instructor:

- styrofoam manikin head
- plaster infused bandage strips
- some materials for embellishment, glue, brushes **SUPPLIES** participants need to bring:
- disposable gloves, work clothes
- personal materials participants may want to use for embellishment (eg. Paint, glitter, fancy edging, wire, beads)

Ice Castles Edmonton...

When I first approached Ice Castles some 6 or 7 years ago, I was excited to have them create Edmonton's first Ice Castle. It took a couple years of negotiation but it finally happened 5 years ago. To me, it is a spectacular sculpture and art installation that transports people into a different world. Needing a change, I began working with the team of artist to create this spectacle three years ago and this year I took on one of my greatest challenges of my career: Build Manager for Ice Castles Edmonton.

Grateful and blessed for this a opportunity, I quickly recognized that this was definitely a team effort. The castle is built through a series of irrigation lines and 72 sprinkler head which are used to spray on icicles in different configurations to grow the castle. For it to be successful, a commitment from my team was imperative, so I set about creating as positive a work place environment as I possibly could. The 30 plus people working on the project were broken down into 7 teams, each responsible for their own area. If any area was falling behind, we collectively pitched in to catch them up.

Each day, we had morning meetings to collectively decide on the days tasks, express concerns, problem solve and encourage each other. Rather than focussing of the problems (and there were many), we focussed on solutions. Even when the problems seemed insurmountable and the only option seemed to be going to a dark place, I forced myself to focus on being in a place of gratitude. Having an attitude of gratitude is infectious and empowers people to let their talents shine. The results speak for themselves and I could not be more proud of the people who made it happen.

MOSAIC WORKSHOP

LOCATION: On my deck--weather permitting In garage if weather does not allow outside work Come dressed for hot/cold or anything in between

MATERIALS PROVIDED: one styrofoam ball, one Ikea mirror, tile adhesive, grout, glass cutters, nippers, mosaic tesserae, sponges

YOU BRING: safety glasses, disposable gloves, lunch, messy work clothes or apron - especially for grouting May 4, mosaic tesserae you might like to add eg, jewellery, buttons, etc.

MOSAIC WORKSHOP OUTLINE:

DAY 1: Instruction on mosaic materials and techniques. Begin putting tesserae on supports (styrofoam ball and/or lkea mirror).

HOMEWORK: finish putting mosaic on project

DAY 2: Grind off sharp edges of glass or mirror tesserae. Grout project. You will have a choice of black, white or grey grout. Keep this in mind when you are

choosing colors for your mosaic pieces--contrast works best

HOMEWORK: wipe off excess grout and put project in plastic to dry slowly. (24 hrs.)

HOMEWORK: Remove any dried grout from mosaic tesserae. Paint wash of India ink to make the black grout really black and blue paint to brighten up the blue grout. Wipe projects with clean water and polish with cloth. When dry, paint grout with sealer to protect from stains, etc.

MOSAIC VOCABULARY

Mosaic: Many pieces of any material, which, when put together, make a picture or complete a surface area.

Tesserae: Pieces of any material used to make mosaics. These include traditional materials such as smalti (a kind of stone that is used in mosaic art)., vitreous glass, marble, stones and pebbles but also broken tiles, stained glass, seeds, beads, jewellery, washers and many more found materials.

Tools: Glass cutters, nippers, tile breakers and the more traditional hammer and hardie (upside down v that you place your smalti or other tiles on to break them with a hammer).

Supports: Mosaic can be done on many different surfaces. The placement (where the mosaic will be

placed), longevity (how long you want it to last) and surface itself (very shiny and very bumpy are

difficult) will determine the surface you choose. MDF - medium density fibreboard, plywood (marine

for outdoors), styrofoam, raw ceramics are some that work. The surface must not be pliable otherwise you run the risk of it warping. Most surfaces should be scored or sanded to provide better adhesion.

Adhesives and Glues: Used for attaching the tesserae to the backing. For indoor projects, tile adhesive works--for outdoor work, thinset mortar (cement based) is best. White glue (PVA) may also be used for lighter tesserae.

Grout: This is used to fill in the spaces between tesserae. Unless the spaces between tesserae are consistent, sanded (as opposed to non-sanded) grout is best. Grout comes in powdered and pre-mixed packages, the former being less expensive.

Grout Sealer: Once the grout is dry, this is painted over all grouted areas to prevent it from getting stained or dirty.

Other Materials: Containers for water and mixing grout, safety glasses (when cutting glass), face mask (when mixing grout), rubber gloves (for applying grout), sponges (wiping off excess grout), clean rags to do the final polishing. Also, acrylic paint for finishing sides and back or some added details.
