

But while selling my art may be a challenge right now, appreciating the art of others motivates me into the studio to experiment and sculpt, and to look for new opportunities.

It is sad to have all our exhibitions and workshops cancelled right as we were heading into the busy season. **NOA** has been moved to November 6-8. The magazine has been printed and will be distributed throughout the summer. The auction did continue and sales were not what everyone had hoped, but they will support printing of the magazine, so that is a positive. I'm certain there will be another auction as part of the November event.

VASA is closed until the end of May, but our exhibition may still be a go *for now*; but things may change between when I write this and when you read it. The best we can do is keep producing for the exhibition while crossing our fingers that it will not be cancelled or in the hope it will only be postponed!

The **Jasper Artists Guild (JAG)** is really enthusiastic about doing joint exhibitions with us. Tentatively, we are looking at August/September in Jasper – with an opening reception timed to allow those of us who are trucking our work out there to participate. Studio YEG Art is on board to host the Edmonton exhibition and will share commission with us. We have tentatively booked November/December at the gallery; however, with NOA opening November 6, it would make sense to move it to October/November so the opening will not interfere with NOA. This is still to be confirmed with the gallery and JAG.

I have not heard from **Northlands** about the potential art exhibition we have been planning for K-Days. I'm hearing the future of the Stampede uncertain; so I would expect the same for K-Days. When I hear more I will let you know.

Shawn Olander is working to cancel and reschedule **workshops** and will be in touch with some of you about your interest in sharing your knowledge when this pandemic has been tamed. I'm grateful to her, Carroll Charest and everyone on the board for working to make the necessary adjustments as we move through this.

On a more positive note: Our submission, "Magic of a Smile", has been sent to the **McMullen Gallery** for the 2021 season. Here's hoping we will receive some good news! Thanks to the 12 sculptors who shared your work for

the submission! I think it was a good representation of who we are as an association.


Workshops...

GOOD NEWS in difficult times... Ritchie Unveils His Bronze Sculpture in Ice District

An epic 5 year journey is coming to an end. It is every sculptors dream to create a public bronze sculpture but when your first commission is the iconic Canadian legends, Bob & Doug McKenzie, it is truly an honour.

It all started when fellow artist, Barb Paterson recommended me to submit a RFP for the SCTV monument project. I submitted my cv, a concept for the project and some rough costs. I and several other artists were chosen to submit a Maquette along with a more comprehensive and accurate budget. I spent a few months creating clay models of six original cast members and stepped back in time as I created the heroes of my youth. All the while I did not think I had a chance. The day came to present my project to the committee. I knew that creating all six characters would be too expensive so I shared that Bob and Doug McKenzie would my choice to honour the Edmonton Entertainment Industry in the SCTV monument. The committee agreed.

Filled with many challenges, stops and starts, the project was made possible by a committed and passionate group of people. Many thanks to Rick Moranis and Dave Thomas for their valuable input; it made for a better sculpture. Thank you to Paul Allard and the SCTV monument committee for their tireless work, support and belief in me and the project. Blessed to have artist, Barb Paterson, creator of the Famous Five monument, recommend me as a potential candidate. Eternally grateful to Vaughn, Mel and the crew at Bronzart who transformed my original clay sculpture to a magnificent bronze. They say they are technicians but they truly are artists and amazing humans. Many thanks to talented photographer, Marc Chalifoux for his help to document the work and

install and to Fish Griwkowsky for his thoughtful article. Thank you to Stuart Ballah whose support and generosity fostered an environment to become the artist I am today. Thanks to Erin Topshee-DiLoreto and so many other friends and family who shared my journey and kept my secret for five long years. Grateful and blessed.

I finished the patina in February and the unveiling celebration was planned for the end of March and I was over the moon with excitement. Then the coronavirus hit and everything changed. My first reaction was " It's the flu? How bad can it be?" Well we all now know how bad it can be. Social distancing and self-isolation are the only way we will beat this thing. The unveiling was cancelled but we decided to install the sculpture anyway.

And so, on the afternoon of March 24th, we began the installation of the boys **on 103 avenue & 103 street** at the entrance to the Winter Garden at Rogers Place. No fuss, no fanfare, they simply appeared but as I unwrapped the protective styrofoam padding Bob and Doug emerged. I knew the boys were home. Grateful and Blessed.

No longer a secret, the sculpture appeared on social media and the outpouring of positive reaction has been overwhelming. Grateful and blessed that peopl connect with and enjoy my art honouring two amazing artists.

I look forward to the day when we can get out of the house and celebrate this tribute to Edmonton's Entertainment history. Until then I will practice social distancing in my studio or home and make art.

We can beat this. Let's do our part to make the COVID pandemic Take Off! Eh!

Keith Turnbull... I have been preparing for the VASA show based on the photos posted by Carroll. I chose the magpies and a Portuguese man repairing a cobblestone street.



The magpie, along with other Corvids (not to be confused with Covid 19!!), has long been one of my favourite birds. It is smart, beautiful and sassy, and does much less damage to the songbird population than the neighbourhood outdoor cats! The piece in the photo is made of paper mâché clay over a styrofoam and wire armature. It is over 42 inches in length, painted with acrylics, and weighs only about 8 pounds



The sculpture of the Portuguese man is made of clay and will be painted after firing. It is about 12 inches square. I put gloves and knee pads on him to enhance his safety. (The man in the picture was using neither).


