

Tell us about yourself and what you do.

I'm currently living in Devon with my husband John and our dog Kaiti. When we retired, we wanted to be in a smaller community. We moved here from Edmonton, where I was born and raised. I love camping, reading, gardening and of course, pottery.




Have you always wanted to be a sculptor?

No, quite the opposite. I am first and foremost a potter. When I first started, I absolutely hated handbuilding. Now I'm finding a whole new side of my creativity.



What is the best advice you have ever been given?

If you don't like something, don't just complain. Find different solutions



It has shown me how to create, it stretches my imagination, and teaches me patience and humility (especially when something doesn't turn out).



What mediums do you work in?

I work in clay. I use wire and sometimes wood to embellish my pieces.

What inspires you?

Nature. I look at colours and shapes and try to imagine how to incorporate them into my work. I find peace in nature and peace in the clay.

What other work have you done besides sculpting?

As I said, I'm a potter first. I love creating functional pottery. My favourite is throwing large bowls on the wheel. I've always enjoyed carving on my pieces and over the last few years have started decorating my pots with dragonflies, flowers and butterflies.

What makes you smile?

My children and grandchildren and our crazy 18-month-old Labrador.

What is your dream project?

I would love to create a large wall piece. I want to carve and sculpt a scene using individual clay tiles.

What is your outlook on life?

I have a very positive attitude. I always look for the best in people and in any situation. I always try to be kind. This has been especially important over the last few years.

Kris Miller has been working in the arts for the past 27 years in Edmonton and Sherwood Park, in arts administration, education instruction/programming and exhibition curation. Trained as a figurative sculptor, Kris has taught sculpture and drawing at Harcourt House, Grant MacEwan, and U of A. She worked at the Edmonton Art Gallery for 6 years as a Gallery Educator then Studio Coordinator, ran the Smeltzer House Arts Centre for six years, and then moved to Gallery@501, where she has worked as the Education Programmer for nine years and then Curator since late 2020. Kris has a passion for focusing on accessibility and diversity in the arts, arts education and supporting others in their artistic journey.

Kris will share info about Gallery@501 and the recent changes they have made to their spaces and exhibition submission guidelines. She will speak about tips for exhibit submissions, considerations for tailoring submissions to each specific gallery, community engagement and artist statements. Questions and conversation around any of these topics are most welcome, as we all work together to share our stories through arts and culture with our communities.

How has your work evolved over time?

When I took my first pottery class, we had to do hand-building. I swore I would never do it again. After years of only wheel-thrown pieces, I started dabbling with altering shapes and creating pieces that combine both hand-built and wheelthrown elements. A few years ago, I was challenged to make my first mask. I was hooked. I have since been experimenting with fountains, birdbaths and "critter" banks. Piggy banks are fine, but there are so many other cute critters to use. My favourite has to be a chubby hippo named Horatio. (Yes, all my banks have names).

Do you have a favourite work of art or artist?

Not really, though I greatly admire the work of my mother-in-law Pat Fairhead. At 95 she is still actively painting and exhibiting her work.

What role does the artist have in modern society?

The role of the artist is pretty much the same as it has always been, to add beauty to the world and give both the artist and their audience an escape from daily cares.

What is the best thing about being an artist?

Creating. Making something that pleases others and myself. I find that as soon as my hands touch the clay, I relax totally.

What is the worst? Marketing my work.

What advice would you give your younger self?

Don't let your fears and doubts or other peoples' opinions hold you back. They are your dreams, follow them!

Where can we see your art?

I sell from my studio Mainstreet Mud here in Devon. I also post and sell from my Facebook page @mainstreetmud and Instagram @sallyfairhead.

Artist-in-residence program 2022/23



Harcourt House is accepting submissions for its 2022/2023 Artist-In-Residence (AIR) Program. The residency will be for a period of one year, starting on November 1, 2022 and ending October 31, 2023.

The Artist-In-Residence Program was created in 2002 by the Board of Directors of WECAN Society/Harcourt House Artist Run Centre with the aim of contributing to the development of an emerging artist. The program provides the artist with a stable working environment and helps with the maintenance of a professional studio space and artistic practice. The project is open to visual artists who are Canadian residents working in any visual art media including: sculpture, painting, printmaking,

digital art, mixed media, photography, film, and video.

The AIR is provided with:

- Studio space in the Harcourt House facility with 24/7 access.
- Complimentary oneyear membership with Where Edmonton Community Artists Network (WECAN) Society/Harcourt House Artist Run Centre.
- Complimentary parking for the duration of the AIR Program at Harcourt House.
- Free access to 2D and 3D preregistered life study classes held at Harcourt House Artist Run Centre.
- \$1,800.00 allowance for materials.

- A solo exhibition in the main gallery of Harcourt House of the work developed during the residency.
- CAR/FAC fees for the presentation of this exhibition.

The submission for the 2022/2023 AIR will be reviewed by a jury of professional visual artists, art gallery administrators, curators, critics, and other visual arts professionals.

Applicants will be selected by the quality of work submitted, their demonstration of commitment to serious practice, and how the residency will meet their objectives at this crucial juncture in the development of their practice.
