# When opportunity knocks

In early February I was working on pieces for the Night of Artists Artwalk. I wanted to create several small sculptures that would appeal to and celebrate diversity. I chose beach people and I was inspired by many summers at Martin Beach on Lesser Slave Lake. I created four beach people and put them on social media to elicit a response. It was positive and Darren Kooyman from Harcourt House reached out to see whether I might be interested in an exhibit in the front Incubator Gallery of Harcourt House. They felt the sculpture would complement the work "Vessels" by Wei Yi in the main gallery space. They had a cancellation and needed to fill the space for an April 28 time slot. My initial thought was no but I knew that with some discipline and time management it was possible and I agreed.

My original four pieces were 6 to 8 inches in height. Time restraints did not allow a change in scale so began by sculpting as many figures as possible in that format. Each new figure started a new story and these stories inspired a new beach person action figure or doll. In the end I was able to create 21 figures in total but only 18 of them made the cut. I also created props that would tell my beach story and then began to think about how to present them. Creating a sandy beach for them seemed to be the only logical solution.

I set about planning a sandbox to rest on gallery plinths to host my 18 guests lounging amongst driftwood. After arranging the figures together and researching the existing plinths at Harcourt House Artist Run Gallery my final sandbox was 18 inches wide by 60 inches long. Although the Incubator Gallery is small, I asked myself whether an 18" X 60" installation would be large enough to tell my Day at the Beach story. I thought not.

I looked around my studio and saw some possible solutions. At the start of COVID I began to paint again and spent a good bit of time at Slave Lake. I had many paintings of the area and selected paintings that suited my theme. I also knew that I wanted a large painting of the lake directly behind the beach installation to act as a diorama background of sorts and set out to paint it. I knew that each painting I selected needed to interact and speak to the figures on the beach.

Putting together and creating all of these elements in just over two months is a testament of my faith in the creative process. It is also a testament that things don't need to be perfect to create an impact. My most satisfying work has been to present simple ideas that tell a more complex allegory of the human condition.

I hope you enjoy the exhibit as much as I did creating it.

# Introduction to metal workshop

This April I had the pleasure of teaching an Introduction to metal sculpture workshop to three enthusiastic and talented SAA sculptors. Not only did they arrive fully geared up with their own Personal Protective Equipment, but they dove heartily into the exercises, each going home with a small sculpture by the end of the day.

The participants told me in a prior to work shop questionnaire that all had little to no experience using power tools or arc machines and were nervous and or unconfident. During this workshop we studied metal shaping with leverage tools, step by step confidence building in using a grinder and a welder, and we even tried the plasma cutter and made some shapes with it. We talked about safety, shop setup and other elements of metal sculpture. I believe all felt more equipped to move further into using tools and shaping metal into sculpture.

The Alberta Craft Council is calling for exhibition proposals for the 2024 line-up in our Discovery Gallery, Edmonton. They are seeking out fully developed exhibitions with themes that highlight mastery in craftsmanship; feature new work; push the boundaries of craft; and/or celebrate the achievements of their members. Their public galleries are dedicated to showcasing work by emerging, mid-career, and established craft artists. The proposals can be for individual or small group exhibitions.

The Discovery Gallery presents innovative and dynamic exhibitions that challenge audience perceptions and inspire the public to discover the best in contemporary fine craft. The 436 square foot Discovery Gallery is located on the main level of the Alberta Craft Council in Edmonton and features six to seven exhibitions per year, some of which may be selected to travel to our Calgary Gallery. Each exhibition is accompanied by an article in Alberta Craft magazine, invitations, promotion, an in-person exhibition reception, and virtual artist talk. CARFAC fees will be paid for the exhibition and the artist's talk.

- up to 8 images of your work
- your CV, artist's bio and artist's statement and a statement about the work you are applying with.

All applicants must be a resident of Alberta.


