


How long have you been carving ice or snow?

I have been ice carving for over 20 years.

What is the most unusual carving you have ever done?

It was my first carving; my beginning ice carving.



The coldest temperature was -36 C, the hottest temperature was over +15 C. [At the coldest temperature], it was really difficult to stay out carving longer than 10 minutes. It was too cold.

What was your favorite carving? How long did it take to complete?

I have many favourites in my carving time so far.

What is the largest carving you have ever done?

My largest carving was 25 feet tall with heavy machinery helping to put it up.

Exhibitions report

We are still waiting for feedback on our submissions for 2023. The only confirmed shows are at **Spruce Grove Allied Art Council** from April 11 to May 5 (with details and images of pieces by March 17). Still confirming if a theme is required or not.

We are also accepted to the **Kiwanis Gallery in Red Deer**, Alberta. This show is based on our theme of Creature Comforts, like our show in Drumheller. It is scheduled from Oct. 7 to Nov. 29, 2023. Details to come

We heard back from **501 Gallery** in Sherwood Park and have been declined at this time.

There is a new opportunity for the Night of Artists show. It is no longer at the Enjoy Centre but part of an indoor Art Walk at Bonnie Doon Mall as an all-year gallery - the **NOA Art Gallery**. We have an opportunity to rent space inside it for a month at a time. The board is meeting soon and we will confirm at our meeting, but it may look like a show in March with them. No theme.

Things look like they are starting to pick up! I am looking forward to seeing everyone's new creations for these shows!

We are working with the **Alberta Society of Artists** on a joint show in Nov.- Dec. 2023. Starting in Calgary and another location TBD. This may include ice and snow works as well! Details to come.

Karen Begg recognized with Platinum Jubilee Medal

Karen Begg, a SAA member in Calgary/Cochrane was recognized on Nov. 21 with a Platinum Jubilee Medal from the province for her contributions in the field of art.

Karen Begg is a third-generation worker in her family's foundry, Studio West, which created the bronze monuments around Cochrane. She has worked on pieces in Cochrane including "The Kids" at the Cochrane Library, the bronze work on the Cenotaph at the Legion, the commemorative work dubbed "Jack" located near North Star Ford, and the famous Legacy Statue better known as the "Chicken Lady" on 1st St.

She believes her support for new and emerging artists is what led to her nomination. She has been a good liaison between the artists and the bronze foundry to help artists go from their studio practice into public art. And she's done quite a number of projects herself.

Karen spearheaded various art projects in the Greater Forest Lawn communities of southeast Calgary, where she resides. One project she completed during the COVID-19 pandemic involved assisting seniors in the community. She designed a painting kit that she could give to senior's centres.

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Snow & Ice report
